Sun Protection Procedure

1. Seek shade

- a. The school makes sure there are sufficient shelters and trees providing shade in outdoor areas particularly in high-use areas e.g. where students have lunch and assemblies
- b. Students are encouraged to use available areas of shade when outside.
- c. Students who do not have appropriate hats are asked to play in the shade

1. Slip on sun protective clothing

- a. Sun protective clothing is included in our school uniform and sports uniform. It includes shirts with collars, longer shorts and broad brimmed hats.
- b. Rash shirts (or similar) are compulsory for outdoor swimming activities.

2. Slap on a hat

- a. All students are required to wear hats that protect their face, neck and ears whenever they are outside both on and off the school site during terms 1 and 4 particularly between 10 am and 2 pm when UV radiation levels reach their peak.
- b. Peak caps and visors are not considered a suitable alternative.

3. Slop on sunscreen

- a. The school supplies SPF30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen for staff and student's use.
- b. Strategies are in place to remind students to apply sunscreen before going outdoors, e.g. reminder notices.

4. Learning and skills

- a. Programs on the dangers of UV exposure, sun protection measures and skin cancer are included in the curriculum.
- b. SunSmart behaviour is regularly reinforced and promoted to the whole school community through newsletters, staff and parent meetings, school assemblies and at new staff orientation.
